

CHAPTER 7 Intergovernmental Cooperation Element

66.1001 (2)(g) Wis. Stat.:

Intergovernmental Cooperation element. A compilation of objectives, policies, goals, maps, and programs for joint-planning and decision making with other jurisdictions, including school districts and adjacent local governmental units, for sighting and building public facilities and sharing public services. The element shall analyze the relationship of the local governmental unit to school districts and adjacent local governmental units and to the region, the state, and other governmental units. The element shall incorporate any plans or agreements to which the local governmental unit is a party under s. 66.0301, 66.0307 or 66.0309. The element shall identify existing or potential conflicts between the local governmental unit and other governmental units that are specified in this paragraph and describe processes to resolve such conflicts.

The intergovernmental cooperation chapter identifies opportunities for establishing or maintaining cooperation between local units of government. Cooperation improves lines of communication between different units of government, and aids in the recognition and possible resolution of, conflicts between jurisdictions, and allows for the identification of mutual service needs and improvements.

The intent of this chapter is to identify, inventory and analyze existing and potential cooperative relationships.

Section 7.1 Inventory of Intergovernmental Agreements

Inventory and examination of existing municipal relations allows for the understanding of how municipalities currently work and how these relationships can be enhanced. As the Village of Nelsonville develops and redevelops over the next 20 years it is important for them to continue to work with surrounding municipalities.

A. Village of Amherst

1. Jensen Center: The Village of Nelsonville has a representative on the Jensen Center Board.
2. Amherst Fire District

The Village of Nelsonville is part of the Amherst Fire District, along with the Villages of Amherst, Amherst Junction, Town of Amherst and portions of Lanark and Stockton. An agreement to create the Amherst Fire District was signed January 1, 1993 by representatives of the Villages of Amherst, Nelsonville, Amherst Junction, and the Town of Amherst. The Fire District provides First Responder, Ambulance, and Fire/Rescue services to those areas. The Fire District also contracts to supply fire protection to several other adjacent municipalities or parts thereof, and is in a three-way contract with Portage County and the City of Stevens Point to provide ambulance services within the boundaries of Portage County.

All equipment is owned and maintained by the Fire District. Title to all property is vested in the Fire District and is housed at the fire station located in the Town of Amherst at the corner of Packer Ave. and Fairgrounds Rd. The affairs of the Fire District are handled by the Amherst Fire and Safety Commission, consisting of a representative appointed by each of the

founding municipalities plus a fifth member appointed by the fire chief. The Fire District is basically supported by the communities of which it is comprised based on a formula that is part of the initial 1993 agreement.

Fire/Rescue participates in the mutual aid program with surrounding municipalities and is dispatched through the Portage County 911 system. The Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS) is the system used to implement this program. MABAS is a system through which the Amherst Fire District can request assistance from participating area fire departments in the form of additional equipment and fire fighters. Requests are made according to predetermined lists, called “Box cards”; each box covers a specific set of needs and equipment. Currently there are eleven boxes (1-11) that can be utilized at any time. These “boxes” allow fire departments to quickly request additional help when needed.

First Responders are local residents who volunteer to be the first to respond to accidents and medical emergencies within the area. First Responders are dispatched by the Portage County 911 system, respond in their personal vehicles and attempt to stabilize patients before EMTs and/or Ambulances arrive. Supplies and equipment used by local First Responders is kept at the Amherst Fire Station. The First Responder program is supported financially by the municipalities involved in the Amherst Fire District.

3. Village of Amherst Lettie Jensen Library

The Village of Nelsonville residents utilize the library system in Amherst, currently there is no agreements between the two Villages, although the Village does make donations to the library.

B. Village of Amherst Junction

There are no intergovernmental agreements specifically with the Village of Amherst Junction.

C. Town of Amherst

There are no intergovernmental agreements specifically with the Town of Amherst.

D. Town of New Hope

There are no intergovernmental agreements specifically with the Town of New Hope.

E. School Districts

There is no intergovernmental agreement specifically with the Tomorrow River Area Public School District.

F. County

1. Portage County Solid Waste and Recycling

Together with the Village of Amherst Junction and Town of Amherst, the Village of Nelsonville negotiates a contract with an independent garbage and recycling hauler (currently Harter Disposal) to pick up garbage and recycling at each residence in the Village. Garbage is hauled to a landfill in Marathon County, and recyclables are taken to the Portage County Material Recovery Facility. Commercial properties within the Village contract for garbage and recycling removal individually.

2. Portage County Highway Department

The highway department of Portage County maintains and plows snow from the Village of Nelsonville roads upon the Village's request. Currently there is no formal agreement between the two entities.

3. Portage County Sheriff Patrols

The Village relies on the Portage County Sheriff's Office to provide protective services through periodic patrols and on an "on-call" basis. See Utilities and Communities Chapter for detailed information.

G. State

There are no intergovernmental agreements specifically with the State of Wisconsin.

Section 7.2 Analysis of Intergovernmental Agreements

The Village of Nelsonville Plan Commission feels that current agreements are good.

Section 7.3 Existing or Potential Conflicts with Other Governmental Units

The Village Plan Commission has not identified any conflicts that this time.

Section 7.4 Issues/Conclusions Regarding Intergovernmental Relations

The Village of Nelsonville Plan Commission has met and plans on continuing to meet with the Villages of Amherst and Amherst Junction along with the Towns of Amherst, New Hope and Sharon to discuss current and future relations (cooperation) between municipalities.

Section 7.5 Intergovernmental Cooperation Goals, Objectives and Policies

A. Goals

1. Encourage cooperation between local units of government to ensure efficient delivery of services.

B. Objectives

1. Support commerce and tourism throughout the area.
2. Local units of government work together to maintain appropriate public access to natural resources.
3. Create and protect public green space and water resources in the area.
4. Local units of government work together to develop creative ways to plan for and share the benefits of growth across municipal boundaries.
5. Maintain communication with surrounding municipalities for discussion of Land Use and other related issues.

C. Policies

1. Identify, manage, preserve, and protect natural resources.

2. Share services across municipal borders whenever possible.
3. Explore additional opportunities for intergovernmental and other agreement opportunities.
